#### 2. Committee Work Program Priorities for 1999

It was decided that before the Committee can identify a priority project, an understanding of the broader social planning and operational context was needed (e.g. demographics, emerging social needs and issues). Rod Santiago and Rob Innes will prepare a presentation to provide this context for the Committee's March meeting. One possible project which was identified was the development of a social health/planning report card for the City.

#### ITEM III - NEW BUSINESS

#### 1. Community Policing in Coquitlam

Sgt. Ken McCrindle with the Community Policing Unit of the RCMP Detachment, provided the Committee with an overview of community policing in Coquitlam. Sgt. McCrindle commended the City's commitment to community-based policing and recognized the strategic plan "City Vision" as well as the Mayor's Task Force for a Safer Community as key initiatives which have had a positive impact on how police services are delivered. Sgt. McCrindle reviewed the major program initiatives within the Community Policing Unit, highlighting both staff and volunteer resources. Community Policing service delivery includes Youth Detail, Business Liaison, Crime-Free Multi-Housing Program, Community Police Stations, Bike Patrol, Block Watch, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design, Victim Services, Stolen Auto Recovery Program, Citizens Crime Watch and Speed Watch Program.

#### 1. Community Policing in Coquitlam cont'd/

Sgt. McCrindle highlighted a skill development program sponsored by Human Resources Development Canada and which requires community involvement through a local based agency. The PoCoMo Youth Services Society was suggested as one local agency which could be contacted in this regard. Other community-based connections including SHARE, Greater Coquitlam Volunteer Centre, SUCCESS and Douglas College were also suggested.

Sgt. McCrindle was thanked for his presentation and he left the meeting.



#### 1. Coquitlam Community and Demographic Overview and Emerging Trends

Rob Innes continued the presentation and discussion which he and Rod Santiago had started at the previous meeting. Rob highlighted regional growth management context, goals and objectives. Rob highlighted principal components of the Livable Region Strategic Plan, the City's strategic plan "City Vision" as well as the City's The discussion which followed focussed on overall Official Community Plans. population projection forecasts for the City, the proposed Northeast Coquitlam Official Community Plan and implications and relevance of the City's vision statement to social planning. It was noted that local social service agencies are responding creatively to emerging trends. The Social Planning Committee questioned how it could support the work of local agencies addressing these emerging trends and Eileen Grant reported briefly on the past work of the Social Planning Committee in supporting the initial work of the Fraser North Child Care Society. The Committee's and Council's support in the past has allowed this group to leverage provincial funds to be used within the local community. The Committee then considered ways that partnerships could be forged between local Councils, community business and the local social service agencies.

Rod Santiago reported on a United Way initiative to prepare community profiles in two pilot communities in the Lower Mainland. At this time Coquitlam and Surrey are being considered. It was noted that this process would be an opportunity to identify local capacities, an opportunity to bring agencies together to identify issues and help to collectively plan for the future. It was noted that United Way funds and staff resources would be available to assist in this project. The involvement of other District 43 municipalities in this United Way project will be considered.

Attached to these minutes is the "Healthy California Report Card Initiative", a project after which the Lower Mainland United Way's community profile project is being modelled. At the next meeting Rob Innes and Daisy Quon will outline the proposed United Way process and continue discussion on the California example in order to develop a common understanding of the proposal.

It was decided to continue the discussion at the Committee's next meeting focusing on key issues and trends drawn from the demographic information and discussing these in the context of the City's growth management and planning strategies.

## 2. Westwood Montessori Preschool and Daycare - Request for Support for Expansion

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#### **ITEM II - BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES**

#### 1. United Way's Proposed "Community Profile" Project

Daisy Quon, Committee member and staff Planner with the United Way of the Lower Mainland provided an overview of the United Way's "Community Profile" Project. A copy of her overhead presentation is attached to these minutes.

- How the report will be sustained after the initial year?
- Should the project proceed on a City-wide versus District 43 basis?

For the next Committee meeting, Daisy will provide an update on the project with an outline of the next steps, possible resources and a process framework.

### 1. Westwood Montessori Preschool and Daycare - Request for Support for Expansion

Peter Chen of the Westwood Montessori Preschool and Daycare gave a brief overview of their expansion project. He highlighted, in particular, the issues and challenges of delivering this type of program in the area. The Committee discussion which followed focused on a number of issues including:

- Clarification of capital versus operating costs;
- Provincial Government programs which provide funds;
- The need for infant and toddler daycare in the area;
- What survey work has been carried out to date to identify the need.

#### ITEM III - NEW BUSINESS

#### 1. Affordable Housing in BC - Video from "Opening Doors" Series: BC Housing

The Committee viewed the first of a video series "Opening Doors" which was released by BC Housing and the Knowledge Network. The overall series covers a wide range of issues including an overview of affordable housing, social housing, special needs housing, homelessness, strong communities and the future of affordable housing in BC. The first program introduced a range of issues of affordable housing in BC including current trends and demand.

The Committee's discussion addressed the following:

- 1. The need for longer term home warranties on building standards;
- 2. Profitability of building rental housing;
- 3. Difficulties in managing rental properties;
- 4. Cooperative housing should be encouraged; there are many positive benefits for young families, seniors and singles; co-ops provide a strong sense of community;
- 5. What is the extent of market vs. non-market housing in Maillardville?
- 6. Difficulties in young people finding affordable housing;
- 7. Community resistance to new housing developments;
- 8. Trends in regional and local housing markets;
- 9. Recent socio-economic and demographic trends on Coquitlam as a community;
- 10. The need for smaller, single detached homes;
- 11. The effect of land prices on the ability of certain forms of housing, e.g. smaller lot single detached homes;
- 12. A status of the City's secondary suite policy and regulation.

The "Opening Doors" video series is being shown on the Knowledge Network on Thursday evenings at 8:30 p.m. during the summer. Starting on September 22, 1999, the series will be rerun.

#### Re: Funding Cutbacks to Non Profit Social Service Organization

At the last meeting of the New Westminster Community and Social Issues Committee, there was considerable discussion about the experience of the various member agencies in connection with recent decisions by the Ministry For Children and Families with respect to funding and contract restructuring.

Some of the items of concern, among many, related to:

- the length of time for which contracts are renewed and the lack of clarity around their renewal:
- the lack of funding for special needs child care;
- funding once targeted to front line workers may now be directed to administrative staff; and
- the absence of checks and balances for programs.

On behalf of the Community and Social Issues Committee, I am writing to the member municipalities of the Simon Fraser Health Region to inquire whether there is a similar concern in their community. If so, I am inquiring if there may be an interest in partnering to address these concerns on a region wide level. We would appreciate a reply prior to October 20, 1999 in order that this matter can be discussed at the next meeting of our Community and Social Issues Committee.

On behalf of the New Westminster Community and Social Issues Committee, thank you for considering our request and I look forward to hearing your response.



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

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#### Co-op Housing

Please note that because of the unique structure of housing co-ops, as a co-op member you will be asked to participate and share in the running of the co-op and to purchase shares in the co-op which normally range in price from \$500 to \$3,000. Co-ops are mixed-income communities that else house a mixed profile of residents including families, seniors and singles. Some members pay a housing charge which is similar to rent tessed on local market values and other receive a subsidized uply in which the housing charge is lower and geared to income. If you do not disalify for a subsidized unit, you may wrist necessary applying for a market unit.


#### **HOW DO I USE THIS HOUSING LISTING?**

BC Housing, non-profit housing providers, housing co-ops and housing advocates are working together to create homes, choices and healthy communities for all British Columbians. This listing is intended to provide you with information about the affordable housing options available.

This housing listing tells you how and where to apply for housing and answers questions such as: "Am I eligible?", "Who do I contact?", "How much will I pay?" and "How long will I wait?".

This introductory section should be used along with the housing listings that are available for the following seven regions: Lower Mainland West; Lower Mainland East; Coastal - South Island; Coastal - North Island; North Coast; Southern Interior; and Northern Interior. As well, the largest municipalities such as Vancouver, Burnaby and Victoria are divided into zones for easy identification of developments. For each region you will find:

- \* A map of the region;
- \* A map specifying the location of developments with a corresponding number for each development; and
- ★ Listings of affordable housing for families, seniors and adults with disabilities. Each listing will give you the locations of affordable housing developments and will include, whenever possible, information such as bedroom sizes available, how to apply and other information particular to each development.



#### WHAT ARE MY CHOICES?

Affordable housing is intended for households with low to moderate incomes who for a variety of reasons may be unable to find suitable affordable accommodation in the private rental market. The commonly accepted standard of affordability is that housing costs do not exceed 30% of a household's gross income.

There are three affordable housing options available in British Columbia, they are:

#### 1) SUBSIDIZED HOUSING (RENT GEARED TO INCOME)

The listings included in this directory will give you all of the subsidized housing developments where the rents are geared to income. This housing is offered by the following three types of housing providers:

- A. **Directly-managed housing** is owned and operated by BC Housing. Tenant selection is made by BC Housing.
- B. Non-profit housing is managed by local non-profit housing societies. Non-profit housing is designed to provide affordable housing for people whose income, age, social needs or health needs prevent them from finding adequate housing in the private rental market.

Many of the non-profit housing developments listed in this directory have been built under the *HOMES BC* program funded by the provincial government to provide low- and moderate-income British Columbians with secure, affordable homes. *HOMES BC* is delivered by BC Housing through community-based, non-profit and co-op housing providers.

Please note that a non-profit housing provider may manage more than one development which will be noted with an "O" in the *Additional Information* column of the housing listings. Non-profit housing providers are responsible for their own selection of tenants.

C. Co-op housing is jointly owned and managed by the members who live in the co-op. A co-op is not operated for profit, and no one can buy or sell their unit. Co-op members participate at various levels in the decision-making process. On a voluntary basis, co-op members work together to share the responsibility of making sure that their housing community is strong and vibrant. For each co-op listed, you will find a code of "PR" in the Additional Information column to indicate that participation is required. Each co-op has a membership committee that is responsible for the selection of new members.

#### 2) MARKET HOUSING (RENT GEARED TO THE LOCAL MARKET)

The listings also include many locations that offer housing for tenants with a mix of incomes, some of whom pay rent geared to their income and others who pay rent at or near market levels. If you do not qualify for a subsidized unit, a housing development with market units may be an option. Developments that have market units are indicated in the listings with an "M" in the Additional Information column.

#### 3) SHELTER AID FOR ELDERLY RENTERS (SAFER)

The SAFER Program provides direct cash assistance to eligible residents of British Columbia who are **age 60 or over** and who pay rent for their homes. If you are eligible and pay more than 30% of your total income for rent, SAFER may reimburse you for a part of the rent which is over 30% of your income. The reimbursement is calculated to give the most assistance to people with the least income.

#### WHAT IF I NEED A UNIT THAT IS WHEELCHAIR ACCESSIBLE?

Housing is available for persons who require specially designed, modified or wheelchair accessible housing. Developments that include wheelchair accessible units are listed in the housing listings and are noted in the *Additional Information* column with a "W".

BC Housing also offers a computerized central information and referral service for persons who require specially designed, modified or wheelchair accessible housing. The purpose of the registry is to provide a one-stop information and referral service to any person or family requiring modified housing.

#### **AM I ELIGIBLE?**

Subsidized housing is available for:

- \* Families (a family is defined as a minimum of two people, one of whom is dependent on the other);
- \* Seniors who are 55 years or older; and
- ★ People with disabilities who can live independently and qualify for a disability pension, or can't work because of a disability.

To qualify for subsidized housing your gross household income must be below a maximum allowable income. The amount is set each year by Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) and varies depending on the area and bedroom size required. Check with BC Housing to determine if you are eligible.

#### **HOW DO I APPLY?**

To apply for housing directly-managed by BC Housing, you need to fill out an application form, available from any BC Housing office, or you can download the application form from BC Housing's web site (www.bchousing.org). Staff at BC Housing are happy to provide assistance with completing the form.

In British Columbia, each **non-profit society** and **co-op** is responsible for filling their own vacancies. The housing listings will tell you how to apply for each development that you may be interested in.

Please note that because of the number of individuals/families already on applicant registry lists, some non-profit and co-op housing providers "close" their registry lists and do not accept new applications after they reach a certain maximum number of applicants. Applicant registries re-open as vacancies become available and current applicants are housed.

You may wish to contact the Co-op Housing Federation of BC at (604) 879-5112 to obtain a copy of their magazine, SCOOP, which lists co-ops that have open waiting lists and are therefore accepting applications.

#### **HOW ARE PEOPLE CHOSEN FOR HOUSING?**

Each housing provider has their own tenant selection criteria. Some use date of application and others use a point-score system where points are assigned to determine the households in the greatest need.

In keeping with the unique structure of co-op and non-profit housing providers, each provider may have a slightly different selection process. While there may be slight differences, the majority of housing providers select new tenants/members based on income levels. In addition, co-ops also accept new members based on whether an applicant is willing to participate in the operation of the co-op.

#### **HOW LONG DO I HAVE TO WAIT FOR HOUSING?**

Currently, the number of applicants for affordable housing far exceeds the number of available units. When a unit becomes vacant it is offered to the applicant who has the highest need. The waiting time depends both on the number of vacancies in the developments requested and the needs of all households waiting for housing.

Most housing providers update their applicant registries on a regular basis, however you should ask about this when you apply. It is important that you contact the housing provider if any of the information you originally provided to them has changed. At a minimum, you should contact the housing provider at least every six months to inform them that you are still interested in remaining on their applicant registry. Individual housing providers will let you know if they would like you to contact them more or less frequently than every six months.

To increase your chances of obtaining housing, it is recommended that you apply to several developments simultaneously.

#### **WHAT ARE MY RIGHTS?**

All housing providers have a non-discrimination clause in their operating agreements, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, religion, place of origin, gender, marital status or whether there are children in the family. The B.C. Human Rights Code includes these provisions and also prohibits discrimination based on physical or mental disability, sexual orientation or age.

All housing providers and tenants are also bound by the Residential Tenancy Act.

#### **HOW WILL I BE CONTACTED ABOUT HOUSING?**

When you are one of the next eligible applicants being considered for a vacancy, you will be contacted for more information. At that time, the housing provider may check references or call you for an interview. Since units must be rented promptly, housing providers need a day and an evening telephone number so they can call you when a unit becomes available. If you cannot be reached during the day, it would be helpful if you can give a telephone number of a contact person who can pass the message on to you.

Normally, you will be able to view the unit before accepting an offer.

#### **HOW MUCH WILL I PAY?**

#### SUBSIDIZED HOUSING

The amount you will pay for housing depends on a number of factors, such as the size of your family and the total income your household earns. If you are offered subsidized housing, you will pay 25 or 30 per cent of your gross household income subject to minimum rents. This is reviewed annually. Co-op members pay a monthly housing charge, which is similar to rent.

#### **MARKET HOUSING**

If you are offered a market unit you will pay rent that is comparable to the private rental market.

#### ARE THERE OTHER CHARGES?

#### **SECURITY DEPOSIT**

Some housing providers may ask you to pay a security deposit. A security deposit is money advanced or deposited by the tenant to the landlord. This deposit is held by the landlord on behalf of the tenant and will be returned to a tenant or prospective tenant when their tenancy ends and if the tenant has done no damage to the property. If a security deposit is required the housing listing will indicate this with a "SD" in the *Additional Information* column whenever possible.

#### **SHARE PURCHASE**

If you are accepted into a co-op you will be asked to purchase shares in that co-op. This is because each member of the co-op is considered to be an owner of that co-op. The number of shares that must be purchased and the amount required for each share will vary depending on the co-op. Generally, shares will cost between \$500 and \$3,000 and will be refunded at face value (minus any debts or repair costs owed to the co-op) when you leave. The listings will indicate with an "S" in the *Additional Information* column if a share purchase is required. A co-op will be able to provide you with information about programs that will financially assist you with the share purchase.

#### UTILITIES

Some developments may require that tenants or members pay for the utilities (gas and hydro) used in their unit. If known, the listings will indicate with a "U" in the *Additional Information* column when utility charges are extra.
