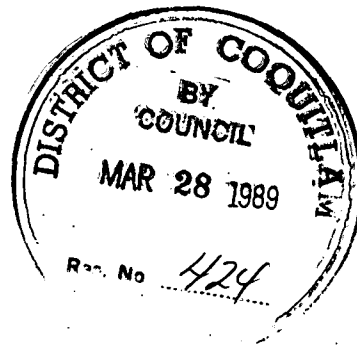

C.R. #886/88 - "That, on behalf of the Centennial Committee, Council authorize the release of \$10,000 from our funding to the Chamber of Commerce for the production of the Tourism brochure and that the Centennial Committee and Council have the right of approval related to the contents, photography and mapping which is to appear in the brochure."

Mr. Larry Rose has now provided a copy of the layout as well as the text for consideration of Council. (Note: Copy of the text is attached - layout material will be available at Executive Committee meeting.)

The Chamber of Commerce is seeking approval of the brochure following which they will proceed to printing. Mr. Rose is hopeful of having the material to the printers within two weeks following approval.

It is expected that a total of 25,000 brochures would be printed with Coquitlam being provided with about 10,000 copies for distribution.

Should Council approve of the copy, it is suggested that the following resolution be adopted:
