A meeting of the Coquitlam Expo '86 Committee of Council was convened at 2:45 p.m. on January 24, 1986, in the Curling Lounge at the Coquitlam Sports Centre, with the following persons present:

### 1.0 The B.C. Indian Days Festival Written Proposal

Mrs. Jeffrey spoke to her written proposal which had been circulated to Ald. Mae Reid, Mayor Sekora, and D. Cunnings.

#### 2.0 Funding Status Update

The meeting was advised by Mrs. Jeffrey that the First Citizens Fund had informed her that a sum of \$5,000 had been approved for The B.C. Indian Days Festival here in Coquitlam but she was still awaiting written confirmation. Turning to private sector funding, Mrs. Jeffrey stated that the Coca Cola Company was prepared to contribute dollars plus advertising and radio station CKNW had agreed to contribute free advertising. On the subject of government funding, the meeting learned that four full-time staff had been approved through the U.I.C. Job Strategy Program which will see The B.C. Indian Days Festival office open on February 10, 1986. Mrs. Jeffrey felt very confident that additional corporate sponsorships could be secured once her and her staff commenced full-time work on this project on February 10.

#### 3.0 Expression of Interest by Native People To-date

Mr. Ben Prest informed the meeting that a number of native groups in the State of Oregon are committed, local dancers are committed, Alberta groups are committed, and the Fastball Tournament will attract large numbers of native people. Mrs. Jeffrey reported that the perception in the native community is that The B.C. Indian Days Festival will be an annual event in the District of Coquitlam.

#### 4.0 Probable Facility Requirements

- (1)Centennial School Theatre
- South shore of the Fraser River, between the confluence of the Pitt River (2) and the Mayfair Industrial Park
- (3)Mundy Park facilities, including the swimming pool on a given date
- (4)Mackin Park
- (5) Sports Centre on a standby basis, in the event of inclement weather

#### 5.0 Highlights

In keeping with the theme "Eye of Understanding", the meeting was advised that there will be:

- a craft village designed by native architectural students,
- a tent village, compliments of the Alberta contingent,
- a legacy project involving native artisans.

#### 6.0 Festival Concerns

- Tenting accommodations, Trailer and RV sites, (1)
- (2)
- (3) Parking and crowd control (venue sites),
- (4) Policing - native constables.

#### 7.0 Park & Recreation Department Concerns

The Park & Recreation Director expressed the need for the municipality to know at the earliest possible date - the actual athletic field technical requirements and the specific dates and times when other park and recreation facilities would be required to accommodate the various athletic, cultural and associated administration activities. Park and recreation staff emphasized to the meeting that athletic facility allocations were made during the latter part of February 1986, and Mrs. Alice Jeffrey stated that her office would focus on facility requirements once The B.C. Indian Days Festival office was staffed and operating during the second week of February 1986.

#### 8.0 Festival Official Name

Mrs. Jeffrey reported that the festival is to be known as "The B.C. Indian Days Festival" with the theme "Eye of Understanding".

#### 9.0 Committee Action

Ald. Reid, Chairman of the Coquitlam Expo '86 Committee, requested the Park & Recreation Director to prepare on municipal letterhead, two letters addressed to Mrs. Alice Jeffrey, Chairman, The B.C. Indian Days Festival, prior to noon on January 27, 1986, and to deliver such letters to the Clerk's Office where Mrs. Jeffrey will pick them up. The first letter is to reaffirm the Municipality's position as to free facilities as set out in the Park & Recreation Director's letter of September 6, 1985, while the second letter is to advise that the District of Coquitlam Expo '86 Committee has officially sanctioned The B.C. Indian Days Festival and its theme "Eye of Understanding" to be held in the District of Coquitlam from 1986 August 9 to 18 inclusive.

#### 10.0 Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 3:45 p.m. and, following the meeting, Mr. R. Munro, Program Manager, was to take Ald. Reid and Mrs. Jeffrey to view the Centennial School theatre in order to determine its adequacy to hold native theatre productions.

#### OBJECTIVE

To Seek Funds to hold the B.C. Indian Days Festival - a major Athletic and Cultural celebration to be held August 9 - 18, 1986 in Coquitlam B.C.. In order to meet this objective, Financial Support is needed from the Private and Public sector.

#### BACKGROUND

Under the sponsorship of the United Native Nations of British Columbia, the Indian Homemakers Association and the Members of the B.C. Indian Days Festival Committee, an exciting Province wide Cultural and Athletic Festival has been planned involving approximately 2000 Native participants in ten major events.

are designed to promote and Indian Days Festival Our B.C. motivate enthusiasm in all educational aspects of our Youth within the scope of Ethnological activities. It will eliminate the lack of understanding and knowledge so frequently seen by our Native Youth at the present time and regenerate vigorous participation in seemly lost aspects of our Culture, by not only allowing our youth the experience of re-learning but also actually re-living our Culture by creating and utilizing all areas of the Performing Arts-related with Ethnology, Archeology and Anthropological studies in the Elaboration and Uniquity of Native Peoples, not only giving <u>The Eye of Understanding</u> to Youths, but to all Multicultural Groups in British Columbia our our and Canada.

Sports and athletics play an integral part in our Native our Youth participation in both Culture. for sports and athletics will be educational, primarily in such events as Lahal Games, Lacrosse, Canoe Races and Track and Field, which will give our Native Youth not only a comprehensive understanding of these Traditional Sporting Events but also present a challenge which will require total involvement and the full use of their in Sporting Events our Forefathers excelled in. abilities Inclusive in our B.C. Indian Days Festival is our Native Arts and Crafts Fair, whereby all Indian Tribes in British Columbia will be represented by their individuality and the renown of their artists, in Arts and Crafts, Leather goods, Beadwork, Weaving and Basketing in which the Eye of Understanding will be enhanced, by the pride, precision, craftsmanship and skills used in the High Calibre Creation of each category relating to Arts and Crafts.

The layout and pre-planning of Tribal Booths for the Arts and Crafts Fair will require a monumental amount of time as Architectual Design will be required in the creation of each Booth which will reflect a symbol relating to each Tribes Traditional Common Heritage. Further imposing our theme - The Eye of Understanding - our overall Festival will be organized in such a manner that our Native Youth will learn the modern day techniques in the Field of Architectual Design by and under the guidance of Architects and the Architectual Institute of B.C.

In conclusion, taking into consideration the Legalities concerning our Festival, primarily regarding Policing, Licencesing, Safety in Crowd Control, Sanitary and Health measures, General Guide Information along with Emergency Services, our Native Youth will learn the fundumentals of all areas of Legalities concerning Youth by and under the influence of the Law Faculty of the University of British Columbia.

Finally and foremost the Educational Gain by our Native Youth from our B.C. Indian Days Festival will not only be invaluable in our present day Culture but will be retained in the Eye of <u>Understanding</u> for Future Generations to come.
